Urban Forestry: Working Together for Green City Values

Cities across the world are turning to urban green space as important contributors to quality of life and city competitiveness. There has been a recent boom in 'green city' competitions and various scholars have stressed the importance of high quality green environments for attracting talent and money. The 12th European Forum on Urban Forestry (EFUF), co-organized by IUFRO, focused on these and related issues. Host was Arnhem, recently awarded the accolade of 'Greenest City of the Netherlands'.

Green city branding

Various speakers stressed the important role of green spaces for city competitiveness. The Swedish city of Växjö, for example, has managed to maintain and develop a large amount of forests and other green spaces. Together with a focus on saving energy and reducing greenhouse gas emissions, this resulted in recognition of its exceptional 'green profile' by, for example, the BBC. Urban forestry is an important element of Växjö's efforts. All of the city's forests are classified and managed according to their specific role and nearness to residential areas.

Residents in focus

Other sessions at the EFUF stressed the importance of involving residents in urban forestry. Arnhem itself offered an excellent example. A volunteer group has e.g. been very active in preserving and managing the city's historical Sonsbeek woodland park. In various projects in the Netherlands, thinking 'out of the box' and building in an element of surprise has proven to be a good way of motivating people to take active part in planning and managing their local environment.

Children and nature

Among urban residents, children are an important target group. Although research is still limited, it points at the importance of natural environments for children's learning and development. Denmark makes use of this important link. In so-called 'outdoor schools', lessons out in nature are part of the regular teaching program. Nearby local parks or green areas can thus become outdoor classrooms where learning is much more fun and stimulating.

Strategies and innovation

For urban forestry to be successful, it needs to be strategic and innovative, connecting to the overall challenges dealt with by cities. Various speakers mentioned the links between human health and nature, with a large body of research now showing the positive impacts of using or viewing nature in terms of stress reduction, physical health, and so forth. Another important strategic 'hook' for urban forestry is climate change. Urban forests can help mitigate climate change, but their role is especially important in adaptation of cities to the effects of climate change, such as heat waves and floods.

12th EFUF

The Arnhem conference, attended by about 90 people from 13 countries, was the 12th edition of the annual European Forum on Urban Forestry. It was held during 27-30 May 2009. This event is co-organized by IUFRO 6.14.00 Urban Forestry. Local hosts included the city of Arnhem, Van Hall-Larenstein University of Applied Sciences, and the Dutch urban forestry core team. Next year's EFUF will be held in the Austrian city of Tulln.

Forest Law Experts Meeting in the Heart of Europe

On the occasion of their 11th International Symposium on "Legal Aspects of European Forest Sustainable Development", IUFRO 6.13.00 returned to the heart of Europe, namely to Slovakia. Slovakia with its rich history in forestry education, research and practice, was the ideal place for that meeting of experts active in forest law and environmental legislation eager to review the state of the subject and to set priorities concerning further research and practice.

The meeting focussed on two major issues: Firstly, the development of modern forest legislation and implementation of forest policy tools in different countries with special emphasis on the West Balkan countries, and secondly, the balance between forestry and nature conservation at public and/or private property level including collisions between regulations in forest laws and environment related legislation. Special attention was devoted to the problems of forest management in protected areas, considering actual threats such as bark beetle calamities induced by biotope protection forests, and the processes of harmonization of activities that "have to be done" and those that "are not allowed to be done" under such regimes.

Nowadays, forestry has achieved recognition as a global issue and sustainable multi-purpose forestry has become the government's policy in many countries. Forests are considered as one of the essential and most important components of the environment. However, in many countries, there is still conflict that originates from different objectives of different interest groups. On the one hand, there are forest owners who want to utilize their forests in the sense of their legitimate property rights, originating from the general constitutional rights. On the other hand, there is an interest of the whole society which wants to care for ecological balance and effective environmental policy, including nature protection. In order to solve such conflicts, it is necessary to use different tools of forest and environmental policy and legislation. The consideration of diverse values and interests of various stakeholders by means of multi-professional teamwork of experts, interagency co-operation, public participation, and settlement of controversies concerning land-use alternatives through negotiation seem to be the future for research in this field.

The symposium took place from 13-15 May 2009 in Zvolen Slovakia and was attended by 24 researchers and practitioners from sixteen different countries including Canada, Japan and Iran. It was kindly hosted by the Technical University of Zvolen, Faculty of Forestry and supported by the host organization as well as the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology, Switzerland. The meeting was organized by Assoc. Prof. Dr. Rastislav Sulek and his staff at the Technical University in Zvolen, including Mariana Krivosikova and Jan Lichy, as well as Peter Herbst (IUFRO 6.13.00). The high relevance of this meeting was emphasized by the continued active participation of the rector of the Technical University in Zvolen, Prof. Dr. Jan Tucek.
