Dear fellow forest pathologists,

It is with great pleasure we officially invite you to attend the upcoming "Root and Butt Rot of Forest Trees" scientific meeting on the West Coast of the USA from August 12th until August 19th, 2007. This will be the 12th international meeting of the International Union of Forestry Research Organization, Working Party 7.02.01. The meeting will provide attendees with a unique opportunity to visit a variety of sites in California and Oregon including San Francisco, Berkeley, Yosemite Valley, Mono Lake, the ghost town of Bodie, Mammoth Lakes, Lake Tahoe, Squaw Valley, Mount Lassen, Mount Shasta and Crater Lake. Spectacular coastline, vast forests, active calderas and volcanoes, high deserts, gigantic waterfalls and the largest alpine lake in the world will all be visited during the meeting. Venues of the conference will include the lush grounds of the Clark Kerr campus at U. C. Berkeley with views of the Golden Gate Bridge and San Francisco; the Mammoth Mountain Inn nestled at over 2000 m above sea level overlooking the high desert and the spectacular Minarets; the Plumpjack Inn at Squaw Valley at the foot of the Tramway used by athletes during the 1960 Winter Olympic Games, and the Red Lion in quaint Medford, Oregon. Meals will showcase the cultural diversity of the West Coast and will include a Chinese banquet in San Francisco's Chinatown as well as an Italian Buffet and a traditional barbeque.

General Itinerary

All transportation during the meeting will be provided in comfortable coaches. The first session of the conference (not to be missed!), will start at 2.30 pm on August 12th at the Joseph Wood Krutch Theatre at the Clark Kerr campus at U.C. Berkeley. On August 14th we will break sessions to travel eastward to Mammoth Mountain Inn in the Sierras, stopping along the way in beautiful Yosemite Valley. After one more day of sessions in Mammoth we will drive northward to Squaw Valley on August 16th. The next day we shall stop at stunning Lassen National Park before entering Oregon and arriving at Medford. Our last field trip to Crater Lake will be held on August 18th. The meeting will end in Medford at approximately 1-2 pm on August 19th after the closing sessions.

Getting There and Away

For your travel plans consider either San Francisco or Oakland International Airports for your arrival, and Medford for your departure. No transportation will be provided between Medford and San Francisco.

Most likely, you will have to book a room in the San Francisco Bay Area for the night of August 11th, while you should be able to book a flight out of Medford in the afternoon of August 19th. There are only a handful of hotels in Berkeley, but nearby San Francisco has a huge selection of hotels. San Francisco (both downtown and the airport) and Berkeley are linked by a rapid train system called BART. To reach the Clark Kerr campus on your own, disembark at Downtown Berkeley on the "Richmond" line and catch a short taxi ride. We will also pick up attendees at 11, 12, and 1 pm on the 12th at the Rockridge BART station on the "Pittsburgh/Bay Point" line, just let us know you will be using our complimentary service.

Optional Pre-Conference Field Trip

For those who are interested (first-come, first-served basis), a pre-conference field trip will showcase the dramatic effects of Sudden Oak Death on August 11th, starting at 9.30 am (pick up will be in Union Square, meet at the column in the center of the square) and will end approximately at 5.30 pm. The trip will include a visit to a majestic redwood stand and to a remote forested beach area. A box-lunch and beverages will be provided to attendees.

Information for Authors

Watch out for the exciting novelties of the scientific program! With the exception of a few longer invited talks, attendees should count on 15-20 minutes for their oral presentations including a couple of minutes for questions. Poster presentations are substituted by short oral presentations. Short oral presentations will be 5 minutes long and will include a maximum of 5 slides. Questions will be asked at the end of a session rather than at the end of each presentation. Two sessions for short talks are scheduled; priority for short talks will be given to students who are not giving a full presentation, followed by attendees who are not given a long talk, and finally short talks may be used as a second presentation by attendees who already give a full talk.

When submitting abstracts for both long and short talks, attendees need to select the focus area of their presentation. Please include first and second best selections among the following focus areas:

- 1 Systematics, taxonomy, and phylogeography
- 2 Ecology
- 3 Aetiology and epidemiology
- 4 Population genetics
- 5 Genomics and plant-pathogen interactions
- 6- Disease management and control
- 7- New reports, diagnostics, and research applications of diagnostic methods

Abstracts should not exceed 1,400 characters, including title, authors and all publication information. Abstracts need to be sent to Dr. Paolo Gonthier by emailing paolo.gonthier@unito.it no later than May 31st, 2007. Emails need to include IUFRO ABSTRACT in the reference box. The conference organizers will try to accommodate everybody, but some long talks may be transformed into short, if needed.

The conference proceedings will not feature full papers, but rather extended abstracts. Please follow the Plant Disease guidelines (http://www.apsnet.org/pd/submit.asp) for style and format details. Short presentations (ex-posters) will not exceed 3166 characters, including title, authors, all publication information, and a maximum of four references. A maximum of two items,

between tables and figures, can be added to the script. Figures and/or tables, including legends, should be formatted to fit into one third of a page, maximum.

Long presentations will not exceed 6322 characters, including title, authors, all publication information, and a maximum of eight references. A maximum of four items, between tables and figures, can be added to the script. Figures and/or tables, including legends, should be formatted to fit into two thirds of one page, maximum.

Deadline for submitting the extended abstracts is July 7th; extended abstracts not submitted by that date will not be included in the proceedings. Before submitting your extended abstract, please ensure with the organizers it has been approved for a long presentation. Extended abstracts should be sent to Dr. Matteo Garbelotto at iufro07rbr-registration@nature.berkeley.edu and need to include IUFRO EXTENDED ABSTRACT in the reference box.
